## Ephesians 2:11-22 – Christ is our Peace

So then, remember that at one time you Gentiles by birth, called “the uncircumcision” by those who are called “the circumcision”—a physical circumcision made in the flesh by human hands—remember that you were at that time without Christ, being aliens from the commonwealth of Israel, and strangers to the covenants of promise, having no hope and without God in the world. But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far off have been brought near by the blood of Christ. For he is our peace; in his flesh he has made both groups into one and has broken down the dividing wall, that is, the hostility between us. He has abolished the law with its commandments and ordinances, that he might create in himself one new humanity in place of the two, thus making peace, and might reconcile both groups to God in one body through the cross, thus putting to death that hostility through it. So he came and proclaimed peace to you who were far off and peace to those who were near; for through him both of us have access in one Spirit to the Father. So then you are no longer strangers and aliens, but you are citizens with the saints and also members of the household of God, built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the cornerstone. In him the whole structure is joined together and grows into a holy temple in the Lord; in whom you also are built together spiritually into a dwelling place for God.

## Reflection

Ian

I have a cousin named Irene. Perhaps you also know someone called Irene – it's not particularly common but there are people going by that name out there. My cousin Irene recently returned to New Zealand after working in Melbourne for 8 years – and those 8 years were the only time since I left home at the age of 18 that a member of my family has lived in the same city, the same state and in most cases, the same country as me. So, it was pretty special having Irene here for that time. She has gone now and so I've got Victoria to myself again, but I mention her today because Irene features significantly in our reading from the letter to the Ephesians. Her name appears there 4 times. Which is because Irene is the Greek word we translate as "Peace".

Christ is our Irene says the letter to the Ephesians (Greek people would say something like εἰρήνη but I'm going to keep apologetically colonising their pronunciation today by saying it in the way that is familiar to us). Christ is our Irene, our peace. He has created in himself one new humanity ... thus making Irene, making peace.

It is all about Irene today. And that's because the letter to the Ephesians like the rest of the New Testament is written in Greek. The Hebrew equivalent of Irene in those books we call the Old Testament, the word we translate there as "peace", is Shalom. For example, Proverbs 3 "Happy are those who find wisdom ... for all her paths are Shalom." The Talmud, the central text of rabbinic Judaism says, "the name of God is 'Shalom'". So, we've got 3 different words from 3 different languages Irene, Shalom, Peace – we translate them in the same way, but do they all have the same meaning? Are they interchangeable? Well, it depends on who is speaking and who is listening.

Today, I want to accept the challenge put to us by New Testament scholar Professor Gosnell Yorke from the Institute for African Renaissance Studies at the University of South Africa. In his article, *Hearing the Politics of Peace in Ephesians: A Proposal from an African Postcolonial Perspective*, Gosnell Yorke challenges us to take seriously the politically subversive world disturbing way the word Irene, Peace, is used in the reading we heard today. Gosnell Yorke asks, "who is listening?" Who is listening as this



letter is read out in public for the first time and what might they be hearing? Who is listening now and what might we hear? Today on this livestream, most of us are not postcolonial Africans, none of us are first-generation Christians living under the Roman Empire. But we are people once more living under lockdown, living in the time of pandemic, living perhaps without as much peace as “normal” (whatever normal is these days). So what can we hear? What is the peace that we know? What is the peace that we lack? What is the peace that we need?

All the paths of Wisdom are peace. The name of God is peace. Christ is our peace. What is the Irene, the Shalom, the Peace that God brings to us, that Christ embodies for us, today?

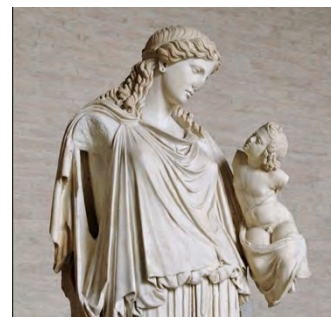
Gosnell York tells us that when Greek speaking Christians living in Ephesus, which is in modern day Turkey, living there as part of the Roman Empire, when they heard the word Irene from Paul (or whoever wrote this letter) their first thought would not have been, “Oh, he’s talking about Shalom like the prophets in the bible, Irene is the same as Shalom.” That wouldn’t have been their first thought, and that’s a pity for them, because in their bible, our Old Testament, Shalom is a magnificent concept, it is a word that holds a meaning bigger than our word “peace”. We sang about Shalom earlier and heard a

vision of Shalom read from the Prophet Isaiah: *The desert will spring to life, a path will be made in the wild, the lion shall lie with the lamb, the day shall extinguish the night.* Shalom is the building up into completeness of what has been broken down and divided up, it is the knitting together of God, humans, and all creation in justice and fulfillment, it is a state of wholeness and delight, of universal flourishing. More than just the end

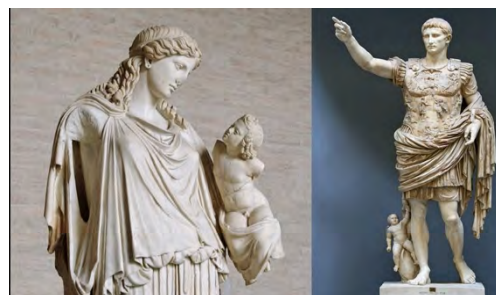


of a war, Shalom is active cooperation between peoples and nations, more than just calm depths within, it is a heart in harmony with all life. Shalom is God’s creation in loving unity, with compassionate communion between all creatures and their creator – a vision of wholeness, the hope and promise of our faith. Bring it on! Shalom is a wonderful word.

But for Greek speaking gentile Christians in ancient Roman Anatolia, or Asia Minor, hearing the word Irene would not immediately evoke this sense of Shalom. They would have been more likely to think of this woman – this is the goddess, Irene, the goddess of peace. Here Irene is holding the child Ploutos, gazing at him with maternal affection, and he looks into her eyes so secure in her embrace despite the all-round absence of arms. Ploutos means prosperity or wealth, he is the God of Plenty and he thrives under the protection of Irene, Prosperity flourishes under Peace according to this statue.



And those Romans were pretty big on peace. Have you heard of the Pax Romana, the Peace of Rome, also called the Peace of Augustus? Augustus was the Roman emperor when Jesus was born. He ushered in a 200-year period of order, prosperity and sustained imperialism. Listen to these words written around the time of Jesus in the region of Ephesus – it’s a proposal to begin the new year on Augustus’ birthday: *We could justly hold [the birthday of the god Augustus] to be ... the beginning of all things. ... [he is] a saviour who put an end to war (debateable) and established all things in irene, in peace ... His birth is the beginning of the good news, the gospel, of irene, of peace ... (Green 133). Yes,*



*Son of God, Saviour, Good News, peace on earth but we are not talking about Jesus – this is Caesar Augustus the bringer of irene, the peace under which the Roman empire thrives and prospers. Can you see how radical and subversive it might be in that time and place to call Jesus, Son of God, Saviour, bringer of the Good News of peace on earth? It’s ridiculous, Jesus is not an emperor, no, he is one of the colonised, a crucified criminal.*

Gosnell Yorke explains, the irene, the 'peace' of the so-called Pax Romana was won and maintained through military conquest and, paradoxically, imposed on the subject peoples by means of warfare and crucifixion – crucifixion was a primary means of 'keeping the peace', break the peace, get broken yourself on the cross. Think of the many nameless colonised peoples who lived under the tyranny of the goddess Irene and the god Augustus. He was able to pacify (or 'peacify') Europe, Asia Minor, Arabia, Egypt and North Africa through force of arms – think of all those colonised peoples – what did peace mean for them? Think of the colonised peoples of the world 2000 years later – Gosnell Yorke speaks of the peoples of Africa, we might consider the First Nations peoples of Australia living under the Pax Britannica, the peace of the British Empire. Peace means something different depending on who is speaking and who is listening.

And so, the ancient Christians of Ephesus receive this letter and hear: "Christ is our Irene". But not the Irene we know through Roman imperial ideology and propaganda under the threat of their cross. No, Christ makes Irene, mysteriously, paradoxically, by being broken on that cross and by drawing all brokenness into himself there for reconciliation and healing. In Christ the goddess Irene becomes Sophia, Wisdom whose ways are Peace, becomes the God named Shalom.



Christ makes Irene, makes peace, creating in himself one new humanity encompassing all the diversity that we are. So, then we are no longer strangers and aliens in our own land, like the Ephesians under Rome, or the Wurundjeri under Brittan, but we are citizens with the saints under the Reign of Shalom, the Kingdom of God, members of the household of God, one family united in our diversity. Citizens, family members called to embody together a peace that subverts and deconstructs imperial power in all its forms, a peace that meets imperial terror with non-violence, and embodies a counter-culture of peace, a new way of being. A way for all creation, a way for all peoples, a way for our hearts.

Christ is our Irene, our Shalom, our Peace. What do you hear today? What is the peace you know? What is the peace you need?
