> Emergence - The Story

Emergence - the BUC Arts bi-ennial exhibition was launched on **Friday 5th November** *and concluded on Sunday 14th November. The launch event was held online hosted by Courtney Rohde, Exhibition Coordinator, and lan Ferguson.* <u>Watch here</u>.

Following the Welcome, Acknowledgement of Country and Blessing offered by lan, Courtney shared the story of Emergence ...

The BUC Arts team and I have been working over the course of the last several months, to bring you this exhibition that beautifully captures how we have collectively emerged over the course of the last 18 months, having encountered things like lockdown, not being able to connect with friends and family, but also the opportunity to explore new things and the opportunity for self-reflection.

With that in mind, I would like to share with you how we came to arrive at our theme of Emergence.



We first starting planning for this exhibition 6 months ago, when the situation was not too dissimilar to where we are now. We were coming out of lockdown, we were able to gather with friends in family, eat in restaurants, travel interstate. With that in mind, we wanted to choose a theme that had a shared thread, something that all of us had in common, something we had each experienced in some way or another.

Obviously, the elephant in the room both forward- and backwards-looking was COVID. We'd just spent 12 months in and out of snap lockdowns, missing out on critical events, putting lots of things on hold – but also with the opportunity to explore new things, to have quietness and reflection in our lives more than we had before. The busyness seemed to have gone away, at least temporarily.

So despite us having varied experience throughout that period, we thought that with all the "temporary-ness" it seemed apt that rather than only looking backwards, we should also be looking forwards. The theme we chose was emergence, as a reflection of the past and how we bring it forward into the future – emerging from lockdown (literally), but also from solitude, and parts of us emerging that we hadn't known before.

So now I'd like to share with you the story behind Emergence as we intended it and invite you to reflect on what these words mean to you, and how you respond.

Story

As we reflect on a year passed, we look back at a year gone, but more pressingly: a present where we find ourselves anew, refreshed but wearied, learned but naïve, undisputedly different.

We have added phrases like "new normal" and "self-isolating" to our vocabulary. We have spent many more moments alone, and yet surrounded in our shared solitude. We have adapted and flexed with the ongoing uncertainty and change. We have navigated the landscape of online community faster than anybody could ever have anticipated.

So what has come of it? What can we take from this period of self-reflection and offer to our future selves – to bring forward and shape our paths? How can we take these unprecedented times and grow from them?

This year, BUC Arts invites you to reflect on the theme of Emergence for our upcoming exhibition.

How have we been inspired by adversity (hope in hard times?) or by the emergence from restrictions and the new life we feel, the freedoms?

What has awakened for us over the past 18 months?

What has this time unmasked or unveiled for us? What has been revealed?

What are we now inspired to share?

A selection from a series of five.


Drawing is everything to me during lockdown.

A focus, a meditation, a joy, a struggle some days and being totally in the moment feeling all emotions. I drew every day for over 18 months. Drawing was my companion and process through lockdown and here are some of the pieces from the practice. Ann invited viewers find a word or words that resonated with the work and to offer alternative titles.

Feedback included comments about the imaginative quality of the work, the way in which the butterflies appear to come out of the page, the sense of fresh air. Alternative titles included 'Serenity' and 'Spirit in Motion'.



We watched 'Talking it Over', written and directed by Janet Watson Kruse. The film features some soup bubbling. Some gardeners discuss the merits of eating someone else's lunch. A mother talks things over – but who is she talking to and where? Based on oral tradition, this gentle film muses on enduring love as understanding slowly emerges. <u>Watch here</u> from 21:00. *Feedback included that it was intriguing, a sweet short film with an emotional twist, a sharing of humanity.*

We watched 'Aces up my sleeve', written and directed by Rissa Bell. A statement from Lesbia

My artistic work encourages observers to imaginatively visit my country Venezuela, in particular my hometown Zaraza. My artwork became increasingly suffused with light and color due to the vibrant nature of that region creating atmospheric and sometimes supernatural effects far removed from the quality of conventional landscapes. By representing rather than hinting, my watercolour paintings make viewers' minds work differently, and they are rewarded by having a sense of feeling and seeing the landscapes before them.

My passion is to paint not what I know but what I feel in my soul and see in my memories.

The pandemic aroused my sensibility for painting which has served:

As refuge in memories to recall and recreate happy and unforgettable moments.

As a searcher for new colours to face darkness.

As combatant to indoor isolation which produces irritability and listlessness.

As a finder of new friends to break this stormy silence.

> Liz Johnson - Artist Spotlight 1

Our first <u>Artist Spotlight</u> on **Saturday 6th November** featured Liz Johnson – a wonderful visual artist working with materials such as charcoal, pastel, watercolour, pen and ink. Liz works mainly outdoors and draws inspiration from nature. She has been exhibiting her landscapes and still life pictures since 2006.

Liz is also a friend to many of us at BUC and together with Beth Shelton reviewed the arts ministry at Brunswick Uniting in 2018. She was also the facilitator for our arts DREAMING day also in 2018 and brought energy and inspiration to our well attended event. She has been part of our creative journey so far!

Leanne Salau hosted our gathering welcoming Liz and everyone joining on Zoom. Liz offered her thanks for the invitation and commented 'It's such a gift to an artist to give them an opportunity to speak about their work and I hope to speak about my work and then have much time for conversation and questions.'

Liz's presentation '<u>Self Care through an Eclectic, Experimental, Intuitive Art</u> <u>Practice 2015-2021</u>' offered a richly textured journey through Liz's art practice. Liz spoke abut her external process of art making and referred to some of the things that allowed her an internal process of thinking and of care for herself.

Liz's practice is to paint outdoors on large pieces of rice paper with her brush attached to polls. She loads her brushes with ink tries to capture the scene that she is painting in one or two movements, then repeats the process with different colours.


Liz shared her experience of having an art studio at Caritas Christie, a hospice and being drawn to draw what she saw outside her studio. Lockdown challenged Liz to work out how to be an indoor artist - this led to a practice of tearing up her works and creating new works as collages. Liz offered many other stories and examples of her art practice, of places she has worked, groups and people that she has worked with and been supported by in return.

Lots of comments were offered and questions asked following the formal presentation. People also shared their own artistic practice. Leanne thanked Liz for her amazing presentation and everyone for attending.

> Clementine Loynd and Colin Hunter - Artist Spotlight 2



Hands that help

Our second <u>Artist Spotlight</u> on **Tuesday 9th November** featured Clementine Loynd and Colin Hunter. Courtney welcomed us to the evening on Zoom and introduced Carlynne Nunn as our host, commenting that it was a Triple C event!!

Carlynne began by sharing photos of works from both Colin and Clem and invited them to speak about their art practice.

Clem started taking art classes in term 2, 2021 after telling her mother, Maxine, that she wanted



to be an artist. All of the works included in the exhibition were created during the mostly online classes.

Clem commented that she really likes having fun with different sorts of art and learning different techniques in the classes. She explained her practice and focus for each of her artworks in great detail.

Colin has always played around with wood but started doing wood carving about 15 years ago. He participated in a one day workshop where he learned about the tools needed for sculpting wood. Colin shared that it takes a long time to produce a piece and will often be working on two or three pieces at a time. He said that he waits to see what emerges from the piece of wood.



Returning to Clem Carlynne asked which of her works was her favourite which is the one of the girl looking out her bedroom window. Clem commented that she is proud of the sky and the shading and that the bed covers which she drew freehand were the hardest part. She also liked not having to draw the girl's face. Comments included that the work was spectacular, so dreamy, it offered an invitation to imagine what the girl was thinking about. Responding to Carlynne's question about which art practice has been the most difficult/challenging for her Clem replied 'the self-portrait' and went on to comment about skin tones and colours. She agreed that her inspiration for this work was Vincent van Gogh. Many people commented on how amazing the work is.



Carlynne then asked Colin which was his favourite piece in the show. He shared that the one he loves the most is the snake carving. Colin always starts with a piece of wood that says something to him - the wood offers up its own gift. Colin's wood carvings are made to the be held, touched, offering a tactile experience. Colin and Carlynne talked about the tension in the work representing the tension in locking down and opening up, individual freedom and corporate responsibility. Colin's process is very much about what the wood offers - he starts by removing the rubbish from the piece and continues working to see what emerges. He showed us pieces that are works in progress including one called the Cracked Madonna and spoke about the spiritual aspect of his work - looking and seeing, being present. He also showed us a piece of wood that he had just started working on inviting us to share what we see when we look at it.

Carlynne continued speaking with Colin and Clem about their art and their practice with others of us in the session also asking questions and sharing comments. It was a wonderful evening.

BUC Arts committee wanted to find a way bring the best of ourselves forward from our experiences, to capture our discovery of new things, new passions, our learnings, in a creative way which led to the theme of Emergence. Courtney affirmed the works offered in the exhibition and encouraged us all to engage with them, to formulate our own responses and to think about what Emergence means for ourselves, think about how we emerged over the last 18 months and what emerged for us.





Ian Ferguson offered a movement meditation called <u>Lockdown Release</u>, using our hands and our muscles, inviting us to notice what we were feeling at each stage of the meditation.

Courtney Rohde & James Balsillie shared <u>Elements</u> by A.R.D Fairburn - a reading of poetry set to James' original music, a collaboration that emerged during time spent together.



The second half of the evening's program began with <u>four songs</u> from Phil Hudson & the Grand Companions. Phil shared that each of the songs have a sub theme around time and waiting.

Saide Cameron shared her story '<u>Gifts from the</u> <u>Pandemic</u>' telling of her family's co-generational share housing experience of living through lockdown.



Tessa Robb offered two original

songs - 'There will be a hill to

climb' and 'Why's he making

eyes at me'

Janet Reus-Smit offered a selection of <u>original poetry</u> readings shedding some light of the experience of lockdown.



Tim Hoffaman told a story celebrating his mother's life and experiences '<u>Dateline 6th of</u> <u>November 2021 Princes Pier Port</u> <u>Melbourne</u>'.



Frank Linehan sang his own composition '<u>Road Runner</u>'. Frank started writing songs and recorded his first album during lockdown in 2020.

Natalie closed the evening thank each of the performers by name for all that we had offered from our creativity, for standing up and being vulnerable, for sharing our stories in all the different forms offered.

She encouraged us to stay on for icecream from 'A Little Room for Icecream', to enjoy conversation and the artwork on display. A generous round of applause followed. Natalie also thanked the AV team - Ray Cameron, Michael Cameron and Ben Hon





Nasir MoradiArtist Spotlight 3

Our third <u>Artist Spotlight</u> on **Saturday 13th November**

featured Nasir Moradi sharing his story and speaking about his art. Of this image used to promote the event Nasir says 'Our life is in transit, whether we want it or not, whether we are rich or poor, whether we are free or prisoners in a glass cage. It would be better



to be like butterflies, able to fly away together."

Abi Benham-Bannon hosted the gathering and welcomed Nasir and his friend and support person Sofia. Nasir is an asylum seeker and has been unjustly held in detention for seven years. He is a self-taught artist, his work has and continues to be shown in many exhibitions. Abi commented that for her Nasir's work captures *'heart and hope and pain and love all at once'*.

Nasir shared his appreciation for the encouragement and help that he receives from a lot of people, the hope that this gives him. Our congregation has been privileged to host some of Nasir's more than 300 paintings including four in the Emergence exhibition.

Sofia shared her story of how she came to be a support person for Nasir and the connections they have made. Nasir began painting while in detention with his first work created using coffee dregs. Sofia became passionate about sharing Nasir's work with schools and students initially. Nasir has no formal training and paints from his heart, of his dreams for life beyond detention, his longing for freedom, his hope that Australia might one day become his home and his gratitude for all the support that he receives.

In addition to paintings which are exhibited beyond the detention centre Nasir also seeks to bring hope to his fellow detainees by painting on walls and fences in the detention centre.

After the formal presentation we enjoyed further conversation with Nasir sharing our appreciation for his work and his generosity. His bold colours and shapes, often set within detailed landscapes, convey deep feelings of the human experience. And it's impossible to view his work without understanding his yearning for freedom, for the chance to be treated like a normal human being once more.

The Karawan of Hope

My friends are far off in the distance in their karawan. Karawan is the Afghani word meaning group travelling with their camels. I am still chainec to the tree. I wish to have freedor and remember what it feels like. All I have left is hope.

A place to call home – Dreams of life beyond detention

I look up through the window of this Broadmeadows detention centre and see a dream of Melbourne City just down the road. I wonder from behind the razor wire fences, are th gardens so green, is the city so tall, are the streets busy with life, and is it everything I dream it to be? Can I contribute something beautiful to this place that might be my home one day? As time goes by this dream fades, yet I hang onto it, grasping it with both hands. I hope and pray that this dream lives.



Devotion Radiation Equation





Our bible readings spoke of destruction and rebuilding, of loss and new life, of death and resurrection – of God turning the world as we know it upside-down. Ian affirmed that we are emerging from a time of loss when so much about our lives has been broken down and disrupted. What new life is now emerging? We focused on some of the many artworks in our Emergence exhibition – works made during lock down, in response to lockdown, often as a way of coping with lockdown. The liturgy including a meditation on four artworks, a journey with the children and a reflection with Matilda McClintock.





Matilda McClintock - Soliloquy for a City

We sang '<u>Where were you?</u>' a song which emerged for Shawn Whelan during lockdown and in response to the Eco-theology conversations series.



Reflection - Soliloquy for a City (Watch here)

Matilda reflected on her artwork in response to questions and prompts posed by lan. Matilda lives in our Student Houses and moved to Melbourne from Tasmania at the start of 2021.

1. Tell us about the inspiration for and process of creating your artwork.

Matilda's work was painted on a cardboard box, a nod to all the boxes involved in moving. She started with the idea of creating an artwork with the skyline as a centre piece with a number of smaller pieces. In getting to know her 5km bubble during lockdown she found a park where she could see the skyline stretched out and took a photo of it. Matilda explained

that soliloquy is a monologue that's not directed towards any other characters in a play. It's intended for someone to be able to express their innermost thoughts or feelings to the audience directly and in. In naming this piece and locally for a city. She found lockdown offered her a chance to get to know Melbourne and herself more deeply.

2. What do you mean by: "I have unfurled into her (the city's) chaos, beauty, and contradiction"

Matlida said that cities have always fascinated her mentioning that she lived in Dahka, Bangladesh, for four years. She spoke about getting to know Melbourne and creating a new community here. The statement she said is 'about how I have related to this space and how I have grown and developed as a person. Through making a new community and finding my feet in a new place.'

3. Today our gospel theme is breaking down and rebuilding. How does this theme speak to your experience of art-making in the lockdown and the emergence?

Matilda commented on her experience of lockdown, of finding hidden gems and experiencing tough moments. She said 'I think in terms of kind of breaking down and rebuilding, this year has definitely been a process of unravelling and weaving together a new tapestry of different kind of threads in my life with different people and different experiences. And so for me in my art making during the lockdown and creating this piece I was definitely in the process of reflecting on my relationship to the city, my relationship to

Melbourne and also to my community back home in Tasmania.

Ian invited the congregation to then move around the space, to find an artwork that really spoke to us and to spend some time reflecting on it asking 'What is the unravelling and the reweaving, that breaking down and the rebuilding in you and what speaks to you?'








> Art on display
