### Reflection – The four holy threads of Christmas

Friends, once again, we have completed our Advent journey, and arrived at the manger of the Christ-child. Each week we have built our village by candlelight, weaving together the four sacred threads of Advent: Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love.

Let's reflect together finally on those four threads, as we complete the Christmas tapestry. For each of those threads is not simply a feeling or a sentiment. Instead, each of them is a conviction. A commitment. Each of them is a load-bearing wall in this church that we share together.

Hope. The first thread. Not merely optimism, or an anticipation of some future pleasure. Hope is the hope of the Wise Ones, who set out on the journey of faith toward an uncertain destination. Hope is the hope of Joseph, who trusts the words of the angels that all will be well. Hope is the hope of Mary's Magnificat, that tyrants will be torn from their thrones, and the lowly will be lifted up. Hope is the hope of Revelation. It is the hope of the new heaven and the new earth. Hope holds tenaciously to the promises of God. To hope is to live in the conviction that the world is not a barren and meaningless place. That goodness is at work and running under the surface to nourish new life.

Peace. The second thread. Not merely the absence of pain or fear. Peace is the peace of the animals grazing at the side of Jesus' cradle. A vision of creation gathered together in harmony. Peace is the quiet stars in the dark sky. Peace is the mother sleeping as her child sleeps, after labour. Peace is an ethic. It is a principle of action. It rejects war, it rejects oppression, it cannot abide poverty. It is restless in its yearning for the safety and well-being of all God's children. It is uncomfortable in abundance that is not shared. It is impatient with wealth that is stored up. It thirsts for justice.

Thirdly, Joy. Not pleasure. Not even happiness. Joy is the recognizing kick of the baby in Elizabeth's womb. Joy is the uncomprehending wonder of the shepherds on the hill. Joy is the laughter of angels amidst their song of praise and glory. Joy is a safely-delivered baby in the arms of his mother. Joy is the life that does not seek satisfaction in materialism, in consumption, in achievement, but in the in-dwelling of the joy of the spirit. The cultivated presence of God that is reflected in the love that we share with our community, the beauty of Creation, and the urging inner-voice that tells us that life is worth living. That it is a gift.

Finally, love. The greatest of all. Not sentimentality. Not a temporary feeling of passion or nostalgia. Love is our law. It is our constitution. It is our judge and our government. It is our yardstick and our scale. It speaks in our heart in no uncertain terms, to tell us what it requires. Love longs for reconciliation and forgiveness. It insists on mercy. It is patient and it is kind. Love is not proud, but it will fight for what is right. It is not jealous, but will make sacrifices for justice. Love is revealed in the child Jesus, God incarnate, who shares our life in the world. It is the love of the Holy family. It is in love that the world is made, and toward love that all things bend. We love because God first loved us.

These are the four holy threads of Christmas. Let us continue to reflect on them together as we sing our next carol.

Carols and paintings were used to teach people who couldn't read or write. Simple stories, with repetitive words, and choruses are easy to learn and remember.

This is how people learned the stories of Christmas, Mary and Joseph, the Journey, the Birth, the Shepherds, and the Angels.

My choice for this reading, The Virgin Mary had a Baby Boy, is a Spiritual from the West Indies, with no known composer.

This Carol has all these things, simple, repetitive words, giving hope and comfort to people living in slavery.

So let's enjoy singing and dancing the Virgin Mary had a Baby Boy. A Spiritual from the West Indies, with a Calypso feel, first composed and sung by slaves.

## Reflection - Jesus, Immanuel, God With Us

Friends, Merry Christmas! Today is a happy day. We call it a day of peace, and goodwill, and joy.

But I wonder if there is any part of you that feels uncomfortable with that. Is Christmas a happy day for you? Perhaps you feel that it is not right to be happy today. That there is too much pain in the world. There is too much want. There is too much inequality. The earnest suffering of Palestinians and Israelis and Russians and Ukrainians and Yeminis and Sudanese and the Rohingya is so acute, so unrelenting, that it is intolerable today to be content.

I think we all share in some measure in that discomfort. If we did not, we would have strayed far from the way of Jesus.

As you hold that feeling in your heart, I invite you to think carefully on the name that the angels give to Jesus. Immanuel. What does that mean? 'God with us.'

Notice how important it is that Immanuel does not mean, 'God is with me.'

For that is always the greatest and most dangerous error of religion. As soon as I believe 'God is with me' I run invariably into the interest of my neighbour. When the athlete prays for success,

they collide immediately with the prayer that their opponent prays at the far end of the field. When the teacher on a school excursion prays for a clear day, they compete with the farmer who prays earnestly for rain. Two nations at war, each pray for victory. It cannot be so.

When I believe in Immanuel, 'God with Me' I can be proud and haughty because God has blessed me above my neighbour. I can store up my wealth because God has reaped for me a special harvest. I can walk past the beggar on the street because their sinfulness has put them there. I can detest people of other faiths and none, because I am God's chosen one. I can be a terrorist, because God's cause is my cause. I can be a crusader and a colonizer, because God wills it. I can stretch out the hand of my power with bombs and guns and landmines, because God has elected my people.

God forbid us from 'God with me', religion.

Now does that mean we should not pray special prayers into our own circumstances? That God does not care for us in our unique individuality? Never. At Christmas, it is the earnest word of God to you that you are known, that you are loved, that you are treasured, and that you are not alone. Our God is the God that Jesus calls 'Father', that word of intimate love and relationship. You, you, capture the entirety of God's attention. The entirety of God's love. God counts the hairs on your head.

But we must not deceive ourselves. If today we are peaceful, and happy, and content, it is not because God loves us more. It is not because God has ordained that some people should have much and some people should have little. It is not because we matter more to God than all the peoples of the world who today long for peace and security and food, or who weep and grieve over those they have lost and fear for. It is only because we have not yet done enough to bring into being the Kingdom of hope, peace, joy, and love for the whole earth. God's Good News of Christmas is always for all people, for all the children of God. Your rights are your neighbour rights. Your neighbour's tears are your tears, your neighbour's want is your want. Your neighbour's pain is your pain.

I hope today is a happy day for you. The love and hospitality that we share with our friends and our family and our neighbour is one of the ways that we bring light into the world. There is no guilt in it.

But hold in your heart the name of Jesus, Immanuel, God With Us. Let that name grow in you, change you, remind you that you do not have God's special and unique favour, except that infinite and perfect love that abides in every human being. Let it remind you that privilege and wealth comes with responsibility. And let it drive you toward little acts of peace, charity, mercy, and love with which the Christ is building his kingdom.
