This special edition of the Olive Branch focuses solely on our journey through Advent and Christmas offering links to reflections and services as well as lots of photos.

> Advent

During Advent we created a village, lighting the Advent candles within it for the traditional themes of Hope, Peace, Joy and Love and partnered them with the additional themes of Darkness, Justice, Protest and Waiting. We sang 'Advent begins' by David Bjorlin, this song provided the inspiration for the additional themes. We also sang Maranatha and Dare to Dream a number of times through the season. We listened to the Christmas Bowl stories, drawing our attention to the work of Act for Peace Partners in troubled places around the world.

> The Village



Planning for Advent began early in November. We met to reflect on the lectionary readings, local and global issues, the Christmas Bowl stories and the pageant. We very quickly decided to connect with the pageant 'It's a village' recognizing that we are all part of a local and global village. We then turned our attention to what we could offer as a visual installation and the idea of a cardboard village emerged.

We are grateful to Amelia Ware for developing a design concept and to everyone who helped to create the village using random pieces of cardboard and paper, chunks of polystyrene and lots of sticky tape and glue. The village grew week by week. The Blue Christmas prayers were



added as a path. On Advent 4 we added people (photos and names), olive branches, an ice-cream shop and a Ferris wheel. We also added paper candles as a prayer offering which were later spread around the walls of the apse.





> Advent Litany

As we lit the Advent Candles each week Cath James invited us to respond in prayer. The prayers were adapted to our themes by Saide Cameron using the Act for Peace Christmas Bowl worship resources.



As we light our first Advent Candle, we open ourselves up to Your Hope in our lives.

We light the Advent Candle and remind ourselves of the darkness of fear, despair and violence that we see and encounter in the world.

We hold on to the hope that we have in you as we enter this time of waiting and preparing.



As we light our third Advent Candle, we celebrate the Joy of having You in our lives.

in prayer and in protest, in working together.

We light the Advent Candle and remind ourselves that joy can be found in ordinary and extraordinary ways

We open ourselves up to the possibility of joy and seek to share this joy with others in your name.



As we light our second Advent Candle, we open ourselves up to Your Peace in our lives.

We light the Advent Candle and remind ourselves of the of the power of prayer to transform the world, a world where many suffer at the hands of others.

We commit ourselves to work and strive for justice and to speak of peace in this Advent Season.



As we light our fourth Advent Candle, we celebrate Your Love.

We light the Advent Candle and remind ourselves that You are the source of beauty and love holding this troubled world in your fathomless care.

We wait now, we wait to celebrate your birth, to celebrate love that fills the hungry with good things.

> Singing on the Steps

Natalie Sims and Jessica Kvansakul gathered us to sing Christmas Carols on the steps after worship on **17th & 24th December**, respectively. As always it was lovely to gather in a big group and sing our way through the little red book for our own joy and to share the love of Christmas with anyone passing by on Sydney Rd.



> Advent worship



3/12, Advent 1, **1 Corinthians 1:3-9**; Mark **13:24-37** Natalie Sims welcomed us to

worship. This was the first Sunday of Advent, and the start of the Church year – the word Advent means "coming" or "arrival" and this is the time when we anticipate the coming of Jesus at his birth, and our expectation of Christ's return. We considered the first of our Advent readings – about being ready and having hope, including in times of the deepest darkness.





We welcomed John Evans (retired minister and member of our congregation) as our preacher. In his reflection 'Maranatha: Come Lord Jesus, come' John reminded us that 'Advent is the season of the Christian year when in which we dream and hope for a better world.' and that 'There is an edge to Advent - and



put bluntly, a challenging edge.' John helped us to reflect on the challenges of the season and offered the observation that 'life, our life together, is like some extended road trip, a pilgrimage, if you like a Christmas road trip. ...'

going on to explore this further together with insights from Jesus and the Apostle Paul. He concluded 'Advent is an important time. It can rattle our cages. But it is fundamentally a time of hope. A time is coming, God will



be all in all. Remember now, as Desmond Tutu once said: goodness is stronger than evil; love is stronger than hate; light is stronger than darkness; life is stronger than death. And why? As we will soon celebrate: Christ who loves us has come. . . and also continues to love us.

Marantha: Come Lord Jesus, come.






10/12, Advent 2, Mark 1:1-8; Psalm 85:1-2,8-13 Amelia Ware welcomed us to worship. We


celebrated the second week of Advent by lighting the second candle for peace. Our service focussed on preparing the way for peace and justice, and the freshness and growth that can come from our faithfulness.













Jan and Kay, with the musicians, sent us out with a sung blessing 'May the love of God surround you'.









17/12, Advent 3, Isaiah 61:1-4,8-11; Luke 1:46b-55 Kirsty Bennett welcomed us to

worship. On this third Sunday in Advent, the season when we when we anticipate the coming of Jesus, we focussed on joy and protest. We reflected on the readings from Isaiah and Luke. We thought about what protest can look like, and remembered that underlying any protest is a hope for a new way, a vision of a different world.







We welcomed Geoff Thompson (member of our congregation and Associate Professor and Co-ordinator of Studies in Systematic Theology at CTM) as our preacher. In his sermon 'Joy and Protest: a disorienting pair' Geoff began by expressing his



gratitude for the way in which our pageants 'always have an edge

be it through the use of satire, comedy, contextual imagination or social critique. Those edges have the effect of disorientation, a defamiliarizing of the familiar in ways that bring the ancient story alive.' He went on to comment that 'the worship committee's choice of our paired Advent themes is similarly an exercise in defamiliarizing the

familiar'. Turning to the theme for this Sunday he said 'joy and protest, it's an interesting pair. It holds together two great themes of the Christian faith ... found in both the Hebrew and the Christian scriptures'. Geoff reminded us of and explored Jesus' ministry, Mary's Magnifact, the Love Makes a Way movement and Martin Luther King's declaration in this context. He concluded 'Advent is a

time of waiting. Yes it reminds us that the Christian hope is in many ways a deeply frustrating hope. What is promised is yet still on its way but this is not an inactive or passive hope. Again to paraphrase Matthew, it is a time to paint a joyful picture of the future to be pointed to. The future that God will eventually bring about. To live in harmony with it now and living in harmony with it now may well generate joy but also embolden us to protest against all that breaks that harmony. And so in this season of waiting with the Apostle Paul we cry in a voice that is both joyful and full of protest 'Maranatha come Lord Jesus'.





24/12, Advent 4 & Christmas Eve, Luke 1:26-38; Psalm 89:1-4 Saide Cameron welcomed us to worship. On a Sunday that was both Advent 4 and Christmas Eve we reflected on the theme for Advent 4 — love and waiting. The psalmist sings of God's steadfast love and Mary receives a visit from the Angel Gabriel. We wait to celebrate the fulfillment of the words that are spoken. Our



village had grown and we added to it during the service — with photos (or names) of ourselves, family and our pets.







Cath's reflection 'Love in waiting' offered an invitation to reflect on the time of waiting shared by Mary and Elizabeth. She began by sharing the story of a friend preparing for the cyclone in Queensland, of the waiting to hear that other family members were okay and went on to note the parallels between Jesus and John in Luke's gospel. Turning our attention to Mary and Elizabeth Cath reminded us that there is only so much you preparation you can do when waiting for something to occur. She wondered if there was something

important to notice in the waiting, the waiting for Mary and the Elizabeth, our waiting now for a new minister to be called. Cath suggested that our waiting needs to be active. 'The end of the waiting is actually the beginning of something new. And strangely and mysteriously during Advent we are waiting for something that is actually already. God among us, God in human likeness. God is flesh. Cath concluded 'Where is God in your life now? And what are you paying attention to in the waiting? God is with us, is always with us.'



We wrote prayers on paper candles in response to Cath's reflection while the choir sang 'Heaven

Everywhere'.

We concluded our worship lighting the Christ Candle.





As we light our Christ Candle, we celebrate You as the Light of the World.

We light the Christ Candle and remind ourselves of the ways You overcome the darkness, and commit ourselves to working for peace & justice.

We join with you in loving our world with our breath, with our words, with our actions.

Blue Christmas

12/12, Blue Christmas,


Luke 2:1-14Jenne Perlstein welcomed us to

worship. We heard the story of Jesus' nativity read in four parts. We lit the Advent candles in turn sharing the responsive prayer. Reflections were offered by Jenne, Saide Cameron and Cath James after which we sang a verse of our Advent song and were then invited to make a response.

Hope and Darkness, Luke 1:1-14. Jenne reminded us that even in darkness we have hope for God is Love, a spark that appears, a glimmer. Writing with charcoal on white paper we responded to 'What does darkness look like to you, where do you find hope?'

Peace and Justice, Luke 2:5-7. Saide reminded us that in her Magnificat, Mary sings of a time of great upheaval. She sings of bringing down the powerful and lifting up the lowly, of filling the hungry and sending the rich away empty. Writing with white chalk on black paper we responded to 'What is the peace that you long for, how will you seek justice?'





Love and Waiting, Luke 2:12-14. Cath affirmed that *in Advent* we remind ourselves of this hope; that in the end there will be peace, God desires us to experience joy along the way and holds us in love. If we can endure the hardship of waiting, new life will come. We responded by gathering in a circle to celebrate Holy Communion laying our prayers around the Advent candles.

We concluded the service lighting the Christ Candle committing to join with Christ in loving our world with our breath, with our words, with our actions.











Christmas Eve Pageant

24/12, It takes a village Cath welcomed us to worship and prayed Loving God at Christmas we are reminded that you come to us as a baby, born in a humble stable human and divine, Let your love shine in our hearts, as we gather and tell the story once again of how you came to dwell among us. Amen

Christmas Day






25/12, Christmas Day, Isaiah
9:2,6-7; Isaiah 11:6-9; Luke
2:1, 3-16; John 1:1-14 Kirsty
Bennett welcomed us to worship on
Christmas Day saying Welcome to
BUC this Christmas Day! The Advent
time of preparation and waiting is
over. Christ is born. God is with
us: Emmanuel. Our service was



shaped by a series of readings offered by a village of voices, and we sang carols, listened to reflections and prayed prayers as we responded.

For our visitors Kirsty shared 'This year we created a village during Advent as we reflected on all the stories and actions and people that are a part of the Christmas story. This Advent we have also focused on the traditional themes of Advent, pairing them with another theme, and so we have reflected on hope and darkness, peace and justice, joy and

protest, love and waiting. We bring all these themes together as we celebrated the Christ child's birth'.



Love. He said 'each of those threads is not simply a feeling or a sentiment. Instead, each of them is a conviction. A commitment. Each of them is a load-bearing wall in this church that we share together.'



Helen Burnham offered an Early Word talking about Christmas Carols inviting us to share our favourites. Helen shared the history of carols noting that they were used to teach people who couldn't read or write about the stories of Christmas. Helen told us about one of her favourite carols 'The Virgin Mary' which we went on to sing.

Dan began his second reflection 'Jesus, Immanuel, God with us' saying 'Friends, Merry Christmas!

Today is a happy day. We call it a day of peace, and goodwill, and joy. But I wonder if there is any part of you that feels uncomfortable with that' and commented on the many ways that people continue to suffer in our world. Dan explored the meaning and intention in Jesus' name 'Immanuel' and the dangers of ignoring it. He concluded 'But hold in your heart the name of Jesus, Immanuel, God With Us. Let that name grow in you, change you, remind you that you do not have God's special and unique favour, except that infinite and perfect love that abides in every human being. Let it remind you that privilege and wealth comes with responsibility. And let it drive you toward little acts of peace, charity, mercy, and love with which the Christ is building his kingdom.'

Note - as indicated in the worship and reflection post the livestream for this service dropped out after Helen's Early Word.

Christmas 1

31/12, Christmas 1, Luke 2:22-40 Natalie Sims welcomed us to worship. We continued our celebration of Christmas season, and let go of the old calendar year as we moved towards 2024, renewed



by the hope that comes with the birth of Christ. We also farewelled Jan and Kay as their time of ministry with us came to an end. As with all 5th Sundays the service offered a reflective focus.











Responding to the gospel, in her final reflection with us, Jan invited us to explore the gift of life with all its uncertainty. We moved into the hall singing Praise the Lord of hosts forever. In the hall Jan offered a wrapped box wondering what gifts might be in it. She then unwrapped a billowing parachute which a group of people raised and lifted as we considered things that we wanted to place into the parachute symbolic of letting go and new things that we want to take forward into the new year, the gifts of love, joy and peace through the challenging and joyous times.

Jan's response



Thank you for having Kay and me as invited guests. In many ways it felt like coming home after 20 years or more. Familiar faces, some had moved on and many new faces.

When I was asked by Presbytery to come full-time as long term

Supply Minister I knew there would be challenges and joys. What I didn't expect what was that it would go to 0.8 and result in 0.6 focusing on planning worship and Annie focusing on pastoral care. Trying to navigate Presbytery guidelines, expectations, assumptions, my own included, with the ministry support team Cath and Kenna, Saide and Gwen, I often felt caught in the middle struggling to find a quiet place.

There's so much going on in this amazing community, so much happening, finding a quiet place can be challenging yet you are blessed here. The most challenging was being offered 0.8 which would include worship and pastoral care, accepting this and the ministry support team and the council deciding on a different model. That is purely your choice.

We all have learned much from the process and that is a good thing. To learn is a good thing, yet by far the joys and blessings have outnumbered the challenges. I am grateful for the opportunity to minister with the ministry team Cath, Peter and Annie who was here for a while, to work closely with Cath and to craft reflections for you and many who are not here today. To minister with each unique and gifted liturgist has been an incredible experience and experiencing the services birthed and supported by the musicians, the singers, the tech team and each one of us is unforgettable. Dancing with Kay and Abi at

the invitation to communion has given us courage to dance on to sing in the choir and to fly in at the end of the pageant was a delight.

Yes we acknowledge the sadness of ending now, very different not taking you through until your called Minister arrives, that is different. Yet difference is okay sometimes it's hard to sit with difference but this has been different and whatever unfolds for you will unfold in the new year. I assumed we'd be here longer but we know what assumptions are, that's right it's difficult when we assume things we can get things a little bit different than we thought. Assumptions are tricky and they can trip us up we thought we'd be here longer but that's okay.

I appreciate the German saying 'Fest ist genug'. Feast, yes enough is a feast. This time has been a feast, to stay on any longer Kay and I might have got into 'gestion' and so might you. Enough is a feast so let's be satisfied, satisfied there's also a German saying called 'bomat', just be satisfied. So we are satisfied.

It's time now for us to rest a while. If you remember back on the one of the first Sundays there were pictures of the Mitta Mitta River, my country. We will return there to be rejuvenated in the next little while, to be on country, to be still, to be quiet, to listen to the trees, to listen to the river, to listen to the creek and to listen to that still small voice inside. It's time for us to rest and it's time, possibly, to visit Kay's family as I mentioned.

So your gift to us is to refocus. Refocus and I guess that's the gift for you, to refocus for the new New Year, refocus so that the lens is clear and your next step will be clear. God's great peace in this next chapter as you navigate the path forward for your calling your permanent minister.

Great peace in this next chapter and to all those who have followed online while we've been here and all those that are dancers that have tuned in nationally and internationally we say farewell and especially to Cass in Leon France, go well dear friend, go well dear friends.

Jess gave Jan and Kay a Nova Cinema Give voucher in thanks on behalf of the congregation. Natalie offered a prayer of blessing and we sang 'May God's Sheltering Wings'

Loving God we celebrate the gifts and ministries that we are called to share in this space and beyond our doors. Today we ask your blessing on Jan and Kay, giving thanks for their many gifts and for the time they have ministered with us. Hold them in your love and be with them as they listen for your call and discern new opportunities, Amen




Olive Way Christmas Party
