Order of Service – 25-2-24, Lent 2

GATHERING

Here, we cross a threshold – we move into a sacred space, and a sacred time, a space and time 'set apart' for the purpose of communal prayer.

During the service the congregation is invited to stand and sit for different parts of the service, however you are welcome to stay seated if you wish.

A quiet retreat room is available for those who need it.

The worship area is wheelchair accessible.

There is a children's corner with books and activities.

Opening verse:

"If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me." Mark 8:34

Greeting Dan

The leader greets the people in God's name and calls us into a worshipful space and state. The bible is carried in and Christ Candle lit – we usually stand (if we are able and comfortable to do so) while this happens.

Friends, let's breathe together.

Today, Jesus says: 'what should it profit a person to gain the whole world if they lose their soul?' What does it profit us to gain the whole world and lose our heart, to lose our spirit, to lose our life, to lose the good gift of creation?

Let's prepare to worship, turning toward God, turning toward the Holy Spirit. Turning toward what is precious, what is good, and what is true.

As we begin our service, we will share of time of worship in the Taize tradition. The musicians will lead us in the Taize chant 'Veni Sancte Spiritus', meaning 'Come Holy Spirit', during which you are invited to sing as and when you wish, or simply to pray, to listen, or rest in the quiet.

Let's turn toward God together, Veni Sancte Spiritus:

This will be an extended Taize gathering experience of about 5 mins, similar to communion. I will encourage the congregation to prepare themselves for worship, to open themselves to the Spirit, to sing along as and when they wish, or simply to pray or listen. Feel free to have a mix of instruments, and for the lead singers to sing the cantor parts if they are able.

HEARING AND RESPONDING

We hear the story of Jesus, Wisdom Incarnate (in the gospels); the story of God's dealings with Israel (in the Old/First Testament); and the story of God's people through history (in Acts and the New Testament letters). Reading of UCA Gaza statement

Uniting Church President Rev Sharon Hollis has expressed deep concern for the unfolding situation in Gaza and reiterated calls for an immediate ceasefire and protection of innocent civilians.

""We're watching the unfolding situation in Gaza closely and hold grave concerns for all those who are sheltering in Rafah."

Leaders across the globe have voiced concerns about <u>plans for a ground invasion of the city of</u> Rafah where more than a million Palestinians have fled since October.

Rev Hollis said, "We're watching the unfolding situation in Gaza closely and hold grave concerns for all those who are sheltering in Rafah. We reiterate our call an immediate and sustainable ceasefire and urge all parties to ensure the protection of innocent lives."

"Our hearts ache and cry out for peace to prevail."

Since the 7 October attack by Hamas militants and retaliation from the Israel Government, the Uniting Church has joined the National Council of Churches in Australia (NCCA) and the World

<u>Council of Churches</u> (WCC) in demands for an immediate ceasefire, the release of all hostages and the opening of humanitarian corridors for the delivery of vital assistance.

Today, Uniting Church members have joined the Ceasefire Pilgrimage in Melbourne (pictured above), including Advocate for the Working for Justice Circle Rev Alex Sangster. During Lent, Christian groups from around the globe are walking the length of Gaza (about 40km) to raise funds for humanitarian relief and support for refugees. They are calling for an enduring and sustained ceasefire, access to humanitarian assistance, release of all hostages on both sides and an end of occupation.
