GATHERING

Here, we cross a threshold – we move into a sacred space, and a sacred time, a space and time 'set apart' for the purpose of communal prayer. During the service the congregation is invited to stand and sit for different parts of the service, however you are welcome to stay seated if you wish. A quiet retreat room is available for those who need it. The worship area is wheelchair accessible. There is a children's corner with books and activities.

Greeting and Call to Worship

We sang Happy Birthday to Wesley as he watched online on April 7th. A lovely memory.

God gathers us from many places. We come with our brokenness, our sorrow, our joy and our laughter. We are many and yet we are one, different and yet the same in our search for a closer walk with God.

So let's stand, as we bring in the Word and the Light, and sing of the community we want to help create.

The story is told through proclamation, which may include reading the Scriptures, reflection on Scripture, symbolic action, art, music, multimedia resources and silence.

Hearing the story requires a response. We respond by making an offering (of ourselves, our gifts, our money, and our prayers for others).

Acts of the Apostles – Acts 8:26-40

Philip and the Ethiopian Eunuch

²⁶ Then an angel of the Lord said to Philip, "Get up and go toward the south^{III} to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza." (This is a wilderness road.) ²⁷ So he got up and went. Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, the queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury. He had come to Jerusalem to worship ²⁸ and was returning home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. ²⁹ Then the Spirit said to Philip, "Go over to this chariot and join it." ³⁰ So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, "Do you understand what you are reading?" ³¹ He replied, "How can I, unless someone guides me?" And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him. ³² Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this:

"Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter,

and like a lamb silent before its shearer,

- so he does not open his mouth.
- ³³ In his humiliation justice was denied him.
- Who can describe his generation?
 - For his life is taken away from the earth."

³⁴ The eunuch asked Philip, "About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?" ³⁵ Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture he proclaimed to him the good news about Jesus.³⁶ As they were going along the road, they came to some water, and the eunuch said, "Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?"¹⁰ ³⁸ He commanded the chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water, and Philip¹⁰ baptized him. ³⁹ When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away; the eunuch saw him no more and went on his way rejoicing. ⁴⁰ But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he was passing through the region he proclaimed the good news to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.
